Festival of Libraries is a joyful celebration of the role that Greater Manchester's 133 libraries play in wellbeing, culture, creativity and more.

This is a festival for everyone that spans internationally renowned institutions such as Central Library, Chetham's Library, The Portico Library and John Rylands Research Institute and Library, Manchester Poetry Library as well as the network of local libraries across the city region, reflecting Manchester's status as a UNESCO City of Literature.

Now in its third year, Festival of Libraries is funded by Arts Council England and enjoys the support and collaboration of authors, artists and creatives, who all believe in the vital community and cultural role of libraries.

June's festival programme highlights this, with a programme that will surprise and intrigue including live music, library exchanges, dance and theatre, poetry commissions, a writing trail, Family Friendly activities and much more, all of which will be free or Pay What You Can to take part in.

Fun is a big factor for Festival of Libraries and the Look for a Book treasure hunt taking place from the 22nd May promises plenty of this. It's set to mobilise children and families as they follow the clues and join the quest to find one of 500 books hidden in Greater Manchester's libraries. Plus the chance for some participants to meet the author.

We have Inspired By Libraries events taking place across Greater Manchester featuring Simon Armitage, Manchester icons Cheddar Gorgeous, Dave Scott and Andy Spinoza plus award winning poet Raymond Antrobus and local hero of The Reno, Linda Brogan.




How would you describe the meanings of everyday English words such as rose, aunt, or giggle?

You have probably come across words in one language that have several translations in another – how can that be? How do dictionaries define words?

Our language activity, run by members of the department of Linguistics and English Language at the University of Manchester, centres around the description of meanings of everyday words and idiomatic phrases. We will use dictionaries from the library to prompt questions about the best way to define meanings. You will have the opportunity to teach others about the meanings of words from your home languages, and even write your own dictionary entries.

"Tasting Children's Literature: An Edible Read-A-Thon" is both an immersive sensory experience and read-a-thon of classic and contemporary children's literature.

From the apple that Snow White should not have bitten and the drink that makes Alice's trip to Wonderland possible to the feast gobbled by the very hungry little caterpillar in Eric Carle's now classic 1969 story and the nut that the mouse finally gets to savour in Julia Donaldson's contemporary classic The Gruffalo, food has long played a central role in children's literature.

The workshop will engage children in drawing pictures of and telling stories about the foods that come to life in their favourite stories, as well as the foods that mean most to them and their communities.

The Rainbow Library exhibition

The Rainbow Library is a UK and Ireland-wide participatory literature creation and publishing project being developed to address the near-invisibility of – and demand for – LGBTQ+ inclusive stories in children's books.

In 2022 a group organised by Manchester City of Literature began writing their stories, which are now on display for the first time during the Festival of Libraries 2023, come and visit, read the stories and celebrate LGBTQ+ writing ahead of the Queer Joy conference taking place in November.



The schools writing trail showcases the 'best of the best' of student writing across Greater Manchester, offering a literature trail in conjunction with Manchester's Festival of Libraries.

The Schools Writing Trail is an exhibition of some of the very best student writing in Manchester. There are over 100 young writers, writing in 12 languages, whose poetry, fiction, and imagination feature in the exhibition. The Trail is a walkable constellation of young voices connecting community arts centres, schools, universities, and libraries with over 40 schools in Greater Manchester. The Schools Writing Trail is a celebration of the young writers who are a vibrant part of what makes Manchester a UNESCO City of Literature.

At each location on the trail, you will be standing at one of 6 locations in the city centre and reading work that was generated from 8 Manchesterbased initiatives: First Story's Connect Event, Z-Arts Story Stars, The Portico Library's annual Sadie Massey Awards and Art of the Book awards, the Centre for New Writing at the University of Manchester's annual Schools Writing Competition, Manchester Metropolitan University's annual Mother Tongue, Other Tongue competition, Saturday Club and, in conjunction with the Comino Foundation, Comino Poet in Residence program.

The games are free to play at all times the Library is open - no booking is required.











Linda Brogan

Join us at Manchester Central Library in conversation with award-winning playwright and artist Linda Brogan.

Linda will be discussing how her pursuit of memories led to the excavation of the Reno Club, renowned in the 1970s for being the best soul and funk club in Manchester and a space for young mixed-race Mancunian who often weren't welcome elsewhere; an exhibition at The Whitworth; and now a book, 12 Words, published by Bluemoose Books.

Authors Carmen, Tia and Catherine were part of the 2016 Reno excavation that took place 30 years after the club was demolished and have written 12 Words alongside Linda, in the process unlocking truths, secrets and confessions.

Andy Spinoza

Join Andy Spinoza in conversation with BBC Radio Manchester Presenter Eamonn O'Neal at Altrincham Library for an event to celebrate the Festival of Libraries, after his archive of media and memorabilia has recently been acquired by the new British Pop Archive at John Rylands Library and Research Institute.

Andy moved to Manchester from London at eighteen and never looked back. An early member of the Haçienda, he reported on the city's music scene for the NME and The Face. He founded alternative magazine City Life in 1983 and spent ten years as a gossip columnist for the Manchester Evening News. As boss of his own PR company, he promoted the dynamic postindustrial Manchester throughout the 2000s and 2010s.

Please note that this event will take place in the performance space at Manchester Central Library.


Emulsion Lift workshop with Lydia Hounat



A three-hour interdisciplinary workshop exploring identity and heritage through photography and writing, to make miniature 'self-collages'.

Exploring the Polaroid emulsion lift process, where participants will take pictures using a Polaroid camera, and then how to perform what's called the emulsion lift process. You may take pictures of yourself, or want to photograph something within the building you resonate with, or something you have with you, perhaps clothing.

You will be able to take the prints home with you at the end of the workshop.

The workshops ask young people to connect historical moments with what is happening in their local communities today. This will support them to develop their own voice within the current political landscape and explore how the power of language has developed working-class consciousness and has influenced political and social change.

The winning poets from these workshops will be selected for publication on the library website and their work will be performed by actors Maxine Peake and Carla Henry at the Library's annual Radical Readers event. In addition, they will receive a WCML badge and poetry prize certificate and a £50 book youcher!



Auður Ava Ólafsdóttir residency

Manchester Literature Festival and Manchester UNESCO City of Literature are delighted to be welcoming Auður Ava Ólafsdóttir as the first International Writer in Residence for the 2023 Festival of Libraries. The Icelandic writer will be here from 3-8 June 2023 and will be hosted by the John Rylands Research Institute and Library on Deansgate. As part of her visit, Auður Ava will enjoy a guided tour of the historic Library and its archives, immerse herself in the city's rich literary community and create a new piece of work inspired by her time in the city. She will return to Manchester in October 2023 to share her new work and her experience of writing in Manchester and Reykjavik as part of Manchester Literature Festival.

Auður Ava Ólafsdóttir is a prizewinning novelist, playwright and poet. She also writes lyrics for the Icelandic performance pop band Milkywhale. Her novels Animal Life, Hotel Silence, Miss Iceland and Butterflies in November are published by Pushkin Press and have been translated into over 25 languages. Hotel Silence won the Nordic Council Literature Prize, the Icelandic Literary Prize, and was chosen Best Icelandic Novel in 2016 by booksellers in Iceland. Whilst each of Auður Ava's novels feature different characters and themes, her writing is always beautifully crafted and features fine observations on nature, life, death, friendship and the human spirit. Auður Ava lives in Reykjavik City of Literature.



Underscore by Quarantine

WHO RUNS THE WORLD?

Underscore is an interactive digital experiment that disrupts the silent power structures of public space through live writing and projection of personal statements with real-time observations.

Set against the backdrop of the Emmeline Pankhurst statue in St Peter's Square, artists Lisa Mattocks, Lowri Evans and poet Molly Twomey will invite three generations of women to go undercover and live report on everything they see and hear as the sky turns black. They will ask and answer questions about what keeps them awake at night, what they wished they'd said and what it all means, turning the tables on who gets to be seen and who gets to watch.

Windrush NHS Stories Launch

Untold Stories celebrates the contribution of workers from diverse backgrounds, in a range of roles, to the delivery of care and to the wider NHS story. In the 75th anniversary year of both the NHS and the arrival in the UK of the ship HMT Empire Windrush, the 'Untold Stories of the NHS' programme, funded by the Arts and Humanities Research Council and led by Manchester Metropolitan University in partnership with Manchester UNESCO City of Literature, highlights the contribution of workers from the Windrush generation, and the communities they founded, to the NHS story in Manchester.

Following a workshop programme devised by Community Champion Jackie Bailey and delivered by award-winning writers including Keisha Thompson, Shirley May and Micah Yongo. the participants of the programme will take to the stage to share their stories.






