

About Our Stories

Over the last three years, with funding from arts councils in four nations, Pop Up Projects - a London-based children's literature agency - produced an ambitious LGBTQ+ literature creation project called The Rainbow Library. The Rainbow Library involved 80 young people in seven cities (Manchester, Nottingham, Basildon, Glasgow, Inverness, Belfast and Cork) taking part in workshops with 11 children's writers and illustrators. While developing their own work, which was published in five digital anthologies, the young people were also directly involved in inspiring and shaping new LGBTQ+ inclusive stories, which the writers and illustrators went on to develop into manuscripts - some of which we hope to publish in the coming years.

The point of the project was to connect professional book creators with contemporary, lived experiences of being young and LGBTQ+. In an age of rapidly shifting language to describe and define more fluid notions of sexuality and gender, we felt it important that books for young people begin to reflect the realities on the ground.

This conference, a no-less ambitious partnership with three UNESCO designated cities of literature in England and Ireland, marks the culmination of The Rainbow Library. Part-curated by young people in the three cities, Our Stories celebrates the power and potential of children's books to 'change the game' for LGBTQ+ people - by including us, by embracing us, by giving us a place in a shared future free from stigma, discrimination and violence.













Since then, The O'Brien Press has published well over two thousand books with nearly half the books published still in print.

They strive for the widest possible market for authors and have an extensive network of international rights agents representing books by Irish authors for all major languages and territories.

Always innovative, they have regularly broken new ground in publishing. The first in Ireland to take publishing for children seriously, they are the country's leading publisher of books for young people. The first to publish true crime, the first to create quality graphic novels, the first to explore many other genres - they are always up for a challenge!

Little Island publishes the best new Irish writing for young readers. Their slogan is "Books create waves". That means they believe in the power of books to make a sea-change in young minds. They believe in books with the power to reach out to the young reader and stir the sea within. They want to publish books that make a splash! At Little Island they are proud to represent the best Irish writing for children, teens and young adults. They were founded in 2010 by Ireland's first ever Laureate na nÓg (children's laureate), Siobhán Parkinson. They remain proudly independent and committed to their founding ideals of publishing high-quality writing and illustration for young readers and having an outward-looking, international mind-set. Their books have been translated into many languages and published around the world.

Kip Alizadeh

Kip Alizadeh is an illustrator and visual artist. When they aren't creating, they like to DJ, spend time with their cats, and play sports. Kip is queer, Iranian, and English, and lives in Belfast, Northern Ireland.



Jamie Beard

Dublin

Jamie 'Beard' Baird is a Northern Irish illustrator. His work, primarily centred around portraiture, is perpetually fuelled by a fascination with people and their stories, and notions of individuals and collective identity much of it rooted in or inspired by the LGBTQIA+ community.

He's featured in multiple books including *Encounter* (a collaboration with Outburst Arts, al-Jumhuriya, and the British Council), *The Little Crayon* (with Amelia Kai) and *Mistaken for a Bear* (with Philip Ardagh). Jamie's clients to date include Belfast Pride, Outburst Arts, Queen's University Belfast, The Naughton Gallery, Lambert Smith Hampton, the Northern Ireland Council for Integrated Education, Ulster Museum and more.



Dylan Calder

Dublin

Dylan Calder is the Director of Pop Up Projects, a social enterprise he founded in 2011, with a mission to empower and advocate for more diverse children's books creators. Pop Up's flagship programme, Pathways Into Children's Publishing, supported by 25 publishers and universities, is a pioneering talent pipeline through which publishers discover bold new voices from under-represented backgrounds. As a queer man, Dylan is committed to ensuring a future for LGBTQ+ inclusion in children's books, and Pop Up's recent The Rainbow Library and current Pathways Northern Ireland programmes demonstrate the organisation's contribution to that work.



Betsy Cornwell Lyons

Galway

Betsy Cornwell Lyons is the New York Times bestselling author of six books for young people, including *The Circus Rose*, a novel in prose and verse that was named a Top Ten title for teen readers in the American Library Association's 2020 Rainbow Book List. Betsy holds an MFA in creative writing from the University of Notre Dame and a BA from Smith College, and she currently teaches at the University of Galway. She lives in a renovated knitting factory in the west of Ireland, which she is working to turn into a childcare-inclusive retreat space for single parents.



Helen Corcoran

Helen Corcoran grew up in Cork, dreaming of scheming queens and dashing lady knights. After graduating from Trinity College, Dublin, she worked as a bookseller for over a decade. She lives in Dublin, writing fantasy novels and haunting coffee shops in search of the perfect latte. Her first novel, *Queen of Coin and Whispers*, was published to rave reviews in 2020 and was shortlisted for an Irish Book Award. The much-anticipated follow-up, *Daughter of Winter and Twilight*, has just been published.

Sasha De Buyl is a writer and programmer from Cork. They are currently Literature and Ideas Programmer at International Literature Festival Dublin and in 2023 acted as Guest Curator for StAnza, Scotland's International Poetry Festival. They were the Director of Cúirt International Festival of Literature in Galway from 2019 – 2022 and prior to this managed Scottish Books International, developing projects and partnerships for Scottish literature overseas. Sasha spent two years working as Literature Officer at Creative Scotland, and has held roles with Scottish Book Trust, StAnza International Poetry Festival, Edinburgh International Book Festival and Aye Write Book Festival. 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Jarlath Gregory

He completed an MPhil in Creative Writing at Trinity College Dublin and works as a freelance copywriter. *What Love Looks Like* was his YA fiction debut.

Adiba Jaigirdar is the award-winning, critically acclaimed and bestselling author of the *Henna Wars, Hani & Ishu's Guide to Fake Dating,* and *A Million to One*. A Bangladeshi/Irish writer and former teacher, she has an MA in Postcolonial Studies from the University of Kent, England and a BA in English and History from UCD, Ireland.

She is the winner of the YA book prize 2022, the KPMG Children's Books Ireland Awards 2021, and was a finalist for the 2022 Lambda Literary awards. All of her writing is aided by tea and a healthy dose of Janelle Monáe and Hayley Kiyoko.



Meg Grehan

Louth

Meg Grehan is originally from County Louth but now hiding away in County Donegal in the north-west of Ireland, with a very ginger girlfriend, an even more ginger dog and an undisclosed number of cats (none of whom is ginger). Her first book *The Space Between* won the Éilís Dillon Award at the 2018 Children's Books Ireland Awards. *The Deepest Breath* won the Judge's Special Prize at the 2020 Children's Books Ireland Awards and was shortlisted for the Waterstones Children's Book Prize. It is published in the USA by Houghton Mifflin Harcourt and in France by Talents Haut. *Baby Teeth* was a Kirkus Best YA Book of 2022 and was nominated for the 2023 Carnegie Medal.



Clive McFarland

Clive McFarland was raised in Omagh, Co. Tyrone and graduated from the Liverpool School of Art and Design. He is an author and illustrator of several picture books, including A Bed for Bear, Caterpillar Dreams, and The Fox and the Wild. His latest book, Standing on One Leg is Hard written by Erika McGann, was recently published by The O'Brien Press. He lives in Northern Ireland.



James Hudson

James Hudson is a speculative fiction writer and editor from Dublin. His writing is published by The Stinging Fly, Channel, Neon Hemlock, PopUp Projects, ShoutOut, and others. He is the editor of the anthology VERY ONLINE and the magazine TOWER, a programmer at the GAZE Film Festival, and a regular organiser with the Small Trans Library Dublin. He endeavours to make Irish trans life richer and more pleasurable through access to LGBTO+ art and literature.



Paul McVeigh

Paul McVeigh's debut novel, The Good Son, won The McCrea Literary Award and The Polari First Novel Prize for LGBTQ+ Literature. His short stories have appeared in numerous anthologies, journals and newspapers, as well as, on BBC Radio 3, 4 & 5, and Sky Arts. He edited *The 32: An Anthology of Irish Working Class Voices* and the *Queer Love* anthology. In 2023, his gay love story, *Big Man*, won an Irish Times Theatre Award and his ten-part short story series, *The Circus*, aired on BBC Radio 4. His work has been translated into seven languages.



Kel Menton

Kel Menton (they/them) is a non-binary writer from Cork, Ireland. They hold a BA in English literature from University College Cork, and an MA in Medieval literature in 2020. Kel was selected as a Young Writer Delegate for the 2021 Dublin Book Festival in conjunction with the Irish Writers Centre, and their plays have been performed at the Fitzgibbon Theatre and the Cork Midsummer Festival. They have been published (articles, prose, poetry) in the Irish Examiner, Good Day Cork, and the ROPES literary journal. They are represented by Laura Bennett from the Liverpool Literary Agency.





Elaina Ryan

Elaina Ryan is chief executive officer of Children's Books Ireland. She has a background in children's publishing.
